English as the official language smooths the transition, though you'll pick up the melodic lilt of Patois surprisingly quickly.

Montego Bay blends small-town warmth with just enough city convenience: lively craft markets, modern supermarkets, reliable healthcare, and an airport connecting you to North America in under two hours.

And then there's the soundtrack: reggae drifting from corner shops, church choirs spilling harmonies into Sunday streets, and fishermen calling out the morning's catch.
